### Events

**April 13:** Saturday evening activities will include an international meal in the Fellowship Hall at 5:30 p.m. and then a session at 7 p.m. featuring guest speaker **Dr. Ed Smith**. Ed has spent more than 30 years in evangelism and discipleship ministries while he was serving as a university professor. He and his family, who attend Redeemer, served most recently in Egypt for 15 years.

**April 14, 9:15 a.m.:** Special sessions during the ABF hour will provide opportunities to learn more about three specific ministries:

- **RREACH** is a global proclamation ministry working to change the way 1 billion people think about and hear about Jesus Christ.

- **Asian Christian Academy** is a multi-faceted ministry in India that includes a seminary, a home for destitute children, a Christian high school, and a low- or no-cost hospital.
- **Vision 2025** is the goal to have a Bible translation project at least started in every language in the world that needs one by the year 2025.

**April 14, 10:30 a.m.:** The guest speaker during the morning worship service will be Douglas Livingston, president

of Dallas-based missions agency Camino Global.

During the missions conference, Redeemer will raise money for two special projects and encourage people to participate in a third:

- We will provide scholarship money for young people to attend Word of Life camps in Hungary and Serbia.
- Funding opportunities for our summer missions youth outreach program.

# “Please pray for spiritual revival in Serbia”

## Q & A with Miro Cizmanski

*Miro and Milotka Cizmanski, with their children, Rebeka and Peter, are Redeemer’s missionaries in Serbia. Miro was in Dallas recently, and answered some questions for The Link.*

### What is your ministry in Serbia?

The ministry is multifaceted. I am an assistant director of the Christian Evangelistic Center, which includes:

- Christian radio
- A DVD subtitling and dubbing ministry
- Literature projects — mostly printing the New Testament and Gospel of John
- Evangelism
- Children and youth camps — together with Word of Life
- Humanitarian ministry, such as Samaritan Purse’s Operation Christmas Child project
- Emmaus Bible correspondence courses
- Seminars on various topics

I am also one of the elders in my local Brethren assembly, where I preach at least once a week and my wife works with the children. I also serve as a secretary of the Brethren movement in Serbia. I am member of the boards of Word of Life Serbia and a Christian recreational camp called Bethel.

### What are the biggest challenges you face?

It is the issue of need vs. the will of God. There are so many needs and so little resources. Which needs does God want to fulfill through me? There are challenges everywhere — not enough volunteers to serve at the camps, limited financial resources to maintain the radio ministry, literature projects to complete and others.

### What is the state of the Christianity in Serbia?

A majority of Serbs would say they are Orthodox Christians. In reality, they kind of believe in God, but live as if He does not exist.

We all do that, actually, don’t we? To them, reading and interpreting the Bible is a job for a priest, not for ordinary believers.

They are very strong about worshiping God through icons and saints — and there are plenty of those — and keeping the orthodox traditions and rituals. On the other hand, there are a small number of evangelical believers — mostly Pentecostal, Baptist, Church of God, independent Christian fellowships, the Brethren Assemblies, to which I belong, and others.

Unfortunately, in the recent past, the testimony of evangelical believers has been afflicted by marital and business affairs, disputes about nonessential issues and leadership positions in the church, and an overall phlegmatic attitude toward the mission and witnessing.

## Redeemer Sending Two Teams to Word of Life Hungary

Redeemer will send two short-term mission teams to support Word of Life camps in Hungary this year.

The first team will support the camps from July 26 through Aug. 4. Members of this team will teach English and baseball skills. A second team will travel later in August or the early fall to refurbish some of the camp’s rooms. There are spaces available on both trips.

“Only 6 percent of Hungarians attend church and fewer than 2 percent are born-again believers,” said **Paul Ramler**, chairman of Redeemer’s Missions Leadership Team. “The Word of Life camps provide a fantastic opportunity for young people to hear the gospel and be surrounded by Christian love, fellowship and nurturing support. Redeemer is deeply committed to reaching the world with the life-transforming gospel of Christ.”

The Reformation never reached the area of Serbia in the past, so the evangelical churches were planted much later than in Western Europe — only at the turn of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. As a result, a majority of the Orthodox people consider Protestants — they also include here Jehovah's Witnesses, Mormons, Seventh-Day Adventists, Satan worshipers and others — as sects that steal the sheep from their flock.

**Tell us a little about your family.**

I am married to **Milotka**, my sweetheart of almost 27 years. She is a great companion and helper in ministry. We have a 16-year-old daughter, **Rebeka**, and an 11-year-old son, **Peter**.

Rebeka is talented piano player, artist and athlete. She is in the ninth grade. We are glad to see her mature spiritually, and she will be a helper at the Christian Camp Bethel for the first time this year, helping with the first- and second-graders. She has a desire to go to the Word of Life school in Hungary.

Peter, who is in the fifth grade, is a very active boy with an ADD problem. He should catch up with his peers by his late teens, according to a school psychologist.

We adopted both of them when they were toddlers.

They are special gifts from God, and we are privileged to teach them God's way of life. Milotka and I both come from families of believers, which is rare in Serbia. We consider that to be a great privilege and responsibility.

**How can we pray for you?**

Please pray for spiritual revival in Serbia. Maintaining a close relationship with God, living a holy life, and being sensitive and obedient to His call is the most important thing in life.

We would appreciate your prayers for our family, especially for Peter and his mental and physical maturity. Pray for the country of Serbia generally, for wisdom for the leaders that we might continue to have freedom and use it to advance the kingdom of God.
